CREDITS NEEDED FOR GRADUATION

New Diploma Requirements for Future Graduates

The state Board of Education adopted new graduation requirements that will be phased in between 2010 and 2014. Oregon students will earn a diploma by completing at least 24 required credits. Additional credits may be required depending upon your local school district. Required credits will increase in English, math, and science as shown below, and students must demonstrate proficiency in essential skills. The new requirements will make sure every graduate is prepared for work, college, and citizenship when they leave high school.

Essential Skills

Beginning in 2012, students must demonstrate proficiency in identified essential skills. The Essential Skills timeline is as follows:


- ▶ 2012: Read and comprehend a variety of texts
- ▶ 2013: Write clearly and accurately
- ▶ 2014: Apply mathematics in a variety of settings

The remaining Essential Skills are as follows:

- ▶ Listen actively, and speak clearly and coherently
- ▶ Think critically and analytically
- ▶ Use technology to learn, live, and work
- ▶ Demonstrate civic and community engagement
- ▶ Demonstrate global literacy
- ▶ Demonstrate personal management and teamwork skills

These essential skills will be phased-in over subsequent years on a timeline to be determined.

Oregon College Transfer Options

COMMUNITY COLLEGE DEGREES AND TRANSFER REQUIREMENTS

Oregon colleges offer a very wide variety of education options that lead to certificates, associate's degrees, bachelor's degrees, and graduate/professional degrees.

Community colleges typically offer associate's degrees that can be completed in two years. They also offer certification programs, non-credit classes, and specialized training programs that are often created in partnership with local industries.

Another community college option is to complete one or two years of study at a community college and then transfer to a four-year university. To ensure a good transfer plan, it is important to talk with your academic advisor at your current college, the four-year college you hope to enter, and the academic department to which you are transferring. The table to the right provides additional information about transfer programs.

Transfer policies for independent colleges and universities in Oregon may vary. You should contact the independent college you are interested in attending for more information about its requirements.

Associate of Arts/Oregon Transfer Degree (AA/OT)

All of Oregon's 17 community colleges offer the AA/OT degree. Students must complete 90 credits.

Degree Partnership Programs

Oregon University System colleges work with community colleges to offer flexible academic options to students. These are commonly referred to as "degree partnership," "dual enrollment," or "co-admission" programs. Students in these programs can be formally enrolled at both a community college and a public university at the same time. For more information, visit www.ous.edu/dualenrollment.html.

Associate of Science/Oregon Transfer Degree in Business (AS/OT-BUS)

The AS/OT-BUS degree is not currently offered at all community colleges in Oregon. You should contact the community college you plan to attend to determine if they offer this program. A minimum of 90 credits is required to earn this degree. At least 62-65 of those credits must meet a set of general guidelines and another 20 credits must be earned based on business-specific requirements.

Oregon Transfer Module (OTM)

The OTM is an approved subset of general education courses that is transferable among Oregon's colleges and universities. Courses are selected from an approved list of general education requirements, determined by each Oregon community college, Oregon University System institution, or participating Oregon independent college or university. The OTM is designed to improve student access to a college degree by enhancing opportunities for the transfer of credits earned at one community college or Oregon University System campus to another public college or university.

Any student completing the requirements for an OTM that conforms to the guidelines below will have met the requirements for the OTM at any Oregon community college or institution in the Oregon University System. At the time of transfer, the receiving institution may specify

additional coursework for a major or a degree and for any additional institution-specific general education requirements not included in the OTM.

Other Types of Transfers

You may transfer college credits between most colleges, and have some or all credits earned at one college apply toward degree requirements at another. However, each college has its own specific requirements about the kind and number of credits that can be accepted for transfer. Be sure to talk with a college counselor about transfer requirements before you start the transfer process.

Oregon Financial Aid

The Oregon financial aid opportunities included in this section supplement the federal financial aid programs on pages 17-19 of the main “Opportunities” book.

GRANTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Grants

The Oregon Student Assistance Commission (OSAC) administers the Oregon Opportunity Grant (OOG), and more than 400 private and public scholarship programs. In 2009-2010, the OOG offered approximately \$76 million for Oregon residents with financial need. OSAC public and private scholarships offered nearly \$17 million. OSAC’s Web site – www.GetCollegeFunds.org – has links to many other important scholarship and financial aid sites.

Oregon Opportunity Grant

The OOG is the state’s primary need-based form of student assistance. Awards for 2010-2011 are expected to be up to \$1,950 for students at participating Oregon four-year public and private nonprofit colleges, and up to \$1,800 for students at Oregon community colleges. Grant eligibility includes students from families with incomes of up to \$70,000.

The application process for the OOG program is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) (see the “How to Apply” section to the right for more information). OSAC determines student eligibility, and awards are disbursed to students via their campus financial aid awards.

Application deadlines for the 2010-2011 award year were early due to budget restrictions. Only students who submitted a FAFSA by the following deadlines were considered for the grant:

- ▶ Community college students – January 21, 2010
- ▶ Students at Oregon University System colleges – January 29, 2010
- ▶ Students at four-year nonprofit colleges based in Oregon – February 24, 2010

If funds become available, OSAC may make additional awards in January 2011.

How to Apply for 2011-2012

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon after January 1 as possible.

The FAFSA is the doorway to all federal financial aid, including loans, grants, and work-study opportunities. A completed FAFSA is all that is required to be considered for the OOG. The FAFSA should include a list of Oregon colleges where the student may attend. OSAC will determine eligibility for the OOG based on the information provided on the FAFSA. Most OSAC scholarship programs also require the FAFSA.

Oregon Financial Assistance and Domestic Partnerships

When determining eligibility for state-funded student financial aid programs, Oregon recognizes domestic partnerships (same-sex couples that have filed an official Declaration of Domestic Partnership with a county clerk in Oregon). A student who is a child of registered domestic partners will be considered the same as a student with married parents, including financial and residency requirements. Likewise, a student in a registered domestic partnership will be considered the same as a married student.

Privately Funded Scholarships

OSAC partners with private donors, employers, foundations, and organizations throughout the state to administer more than 400 scholarships that students can apply for with one common application.

How to Apply

Go to www.GetCollegeFunds.org.

Most students apply online. A paper application may be requested by calling 800.452.8807, ext. 7352. The Oregon Scholarship eApp Workbook includes important instructions, a list of scholarships (details available online), and worksheets to help students apply online. Copies are available at all Oregon high schools, college financial aid offices, and online at www.GetCollegeFunds.org.

Complete the Oregon Scholarship Application (eApp). Visit [www.](http://www.GetCollegeFunds.org/eapp.html)

www.GetCollegeFunds.org/eapp.html to create a login for your e-Student Profile and application. Before you begin the online application, find scholarships for which you qualify by using the workbook or the online scholarship catalog filters. A number of filters are available, including: high school name, type of student, county of residence, academic and career interests, employer/membership organizations, and enrollment status. If you meet the scholarship criteria and are interested in applying for the scholarship, list the scholarship and code on your application worksheet (found in the back of the Oregon Scholarship eApp workbook). While in your eApp, you

can also use the same search filters and select scholarships to add to your application.

Submit correct transcripts and other required documents. Graduating high school seniors can submit a request to their school registrar to have their seventh semester transcript or equivalent (including fall coursework of senior year) transmitted electronically to OSAC using IDTS or a secure Web portal. Instructions for transcript and other required document submission options are in the eApp and workbook. Current college students should carefully review instructions in the online application or the workbook to ensure that you are sending in the correct transcripts for your year in college and for all colleges attended. All applicants must complete the required activities chart and the four personal statements that are included in the eApp. Before clicking the “submit” button of your eApp, make sure to print a copy and carefully review your application, activities chart, and personal statement answers. After submitting your eApp, regularly check your e-Student Profile for messages or until you see “Valid eApp accepted.”

Submit a complete application packet by the Tuesday, March 1, 2011 absolute deadline. However, if you submit your complete application packet by the “early bird” priority deadline – Wednesday, February 16, 2011 – you will receive an early review of your application with an opportunity to submit corrections if errors are found. Error-free applications will be entered

into a drawing for a \$500 scholarship. Check your e-Student Profile for the status of your application and/or a deadline date to submit corrections to your application. Log back into your e-Student Profile to see additional application instructions, accept or decline awards, or update personal information.

Apply every year you are in school. Visit the OSAC e-Student Profile at www.GetCollegeFunds.org and update the previous year’s information, activities, and essays. OSAC retains your application, making it easy to reapply every year.

The Ford Family Foundation

Oregon’s single largest private scholarship provider is The Ford Family Foundation, based in Roseburg, Oregon. Offering several different programs for students of all ages, the Foundation will award over \$10 million this year to college students in Oregon and California. Each year, the Foundation selects up to 300 new recipients from applicants whose past and potential are worthy of special support and development. These candidates demonstrate their understanding of the Foundation’s values of working hard, taking responsibility, giving back, and helping others. Except for the Sons and Daughters Program, applicants must file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and meet Expected Family Contribution (EFC) requirements. Scholarship Programs Offered by the Foundation Include:

- ▶ **The Ford Scholars Program** — For graduating high school seniors or high school graduates who have not yet enrolled full time in college, or individuals who have completed two years at a community college and will enter a four-year college as a junior in the fall. Applicants must plan to pursue a bachelor’s degree at an eligible Oregon college. Recipients must enroll in a full-time, on-campus program in the fall.
- ▶ **The Ford Opportunity Program** — For single parents who are heads of household with custody of dependents and who are without the support of a domestic partner. Applicants can be at any stage in their undergraduate education and must plan to pursue a bachelor’s degree at an eligible Oregon college. Recipients must enroll in a full-time, on-campus program in the fall.

- ▶ **The Ford ReStart Program** — For nontraditional adult students who are 25 years of age or older and beginning or returning to a full-time, on-campus postsecondary education in a certificate or degree program at an eligible Oregon college. Strong preference is given to applicants with limited or no recent college experience.
- ▶ **The Scholarship Program for Sons and Daughters of Employees of Roseburg Forest Products Co.** — For dependents of employees of Roseburg Forest Products Co. who are 21 years of age or younger; applicants may attend any eligible U.S. college. Recipients must enroll in a full-time, on-campus program in the fall and may also apply for the Ford Scholars Program if eligible.

Additional requirements apply to each program. Students with existing bachelor’s degrees are not eligible for Ford Family scholarships. Apply through the OSAC Application. OREGON 529 COLLEGE SAVINGS NETWORK

The Oregon 529 College Savings Network offers tax-advantaged college savings plans that are specifically designed to provide families with a flexible, tax-efficient way to save for higher education expenses. All plans offered by the Network are administered by the state of Oregon through the Office of the State Treasurer, and are governed by Section 529 of the Internal Revenue Code. Benefits of a 529 College Savings Plan

Tax-Advantaged Savings

- ▶ Contributions are deductible up to an annual limit. The deduction limit is indexed annually for inflation. For 2010, the state tax deduction is \$4,180 for taxpayers who file a joint return and \$2,090 for all others. Until April 15 of each year, contributions qualify for the previous year's state tax deduction.
- ▶ Any earnings grow free of federal and Oregon state tax.
- ▶ You don't pay federal or Oregon state taxes on qualified withdrawals.
- ▶ In addition, Oregon law provides a four-year "carry forward" state tax deduction. For example, if you file a joint return and contribute \$20,000 today, you can take a \$4,000 deduction this year and for each of the following four years.

Control

Because the Plan account is in your name, you retain control over when and how your savings are used. In addition, you can select and change beneficiaries to another family member of the current beneficiary, as defined in Internal Revenue Code Section 529, at any time, without penalty. (There may be gift or generation-skipping tax consequences depending on who the new beneficiary is.) You can also name a successor account owner or transfer ownership to another person.

Flexibility


Use your savings to pay for higher education expenses almost anywhere in the United States, including vocational schools, two- and four-year colleges, and graduate schools.

High Investment Maximums, Low Minimums

You can invest up to \$310,000 for future higher education expenses per beneficiary. Accounts can also be opened with a low initial contribution of only \$25. The Plan also allows you to make regularly scheduled contributions through an automatic contribution plan or payroll deduction.

Easy Eligibility

Any U.S. resident who is at least 18 years old, regardless of income or state residency, can open an account.

College Goal Oregon

This national program will hold its fifth annual event in Oregon in January 2011. The program sponsors a free workshop to help Oregon high school students and their families learn about paying for college. Trained volunteers and financial aid experts are available to help applicants complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and learn about OSAC scholarship opportunities. More than 25 sites from throughout Oregon will select from one of three dates to host a College Goal Oregon workshop: January 15, January 22, or January 29. "FAFSA Fridays" are additional online workshops that will occur on the last Friday of each month and are open to anyone in Oregon with computer access. ASPIRE Program

The Oregon Student Assistance Commission's ASPIRE Program provides mentoring and resources to help students access education and training beyond high school. Students at the 115 ASPIRE sites in Oregon have the opportunity to be assigned a trained volunteer mentor, called an "ASPIRE Advisor." ASPIRE Advisors offer one-on-one mentoring to assist students with exploring career options, planning ahead, and finding the best postsecondary fit and funding options, including scholarships and the financial aid process. eASPIRE is the new Web-based version of ASPIRE and provides one-on-one mentoring to high school students through eMentoring. Students and ASPIRE advisors focus on the same topics as the traditional ASPIRE program by communicating through a secure, monitored Web-based system.
