APPLYING FOR AID

To apply for any federal or state financial aid, you will need to complete either the **FAFSA®** or the **ORSAA**.

To maximize your chances of getting a financial aid award, you should apply as soon as possible after October 1.

FAFSA® Free Application for Federal Student Aid	For U.S. citizens and eligible noncitizens. FAFSA® students are eligible for federal and state funds.
ORSAA Oregon Student Aid Application	For Oregon residents who have DACA or undocumented status. ORSAA students are eligible for state funds but not federal funds.

GRANTS

Grants are money for students to pay for college. Grants are typically provided by the state (OSAC) or federal government. In most circumstances, **grants do not have to be paid back.**

<u>Pell Grant</u>: A federal grant for undergraduate students with financial need. To apply, submit your FAFSA®.

Oregon Opportunity Grant: A need-based state grant for undergrad students. To apply, submit your FAFSA®/ORSAA.

Oregon Promise: A state grant for students going straight from high school or a GED® program to a community college. To apply, submit an application and FAFSA®/ORSAA before your graduation date.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are money for students to pay for college. These are funded by individuals, schools, foundations, employers, membership organizations, and much more. Like grants, **scholarships do not have to be paid back.**

OSAC Scholarships: Access 600+ scholarships through a single application. This application opens November 1.

Early Bird deadline is February 15.
The application deadline is March 1.

SAT/ACT Information

Oregon's public universities no longer require SAT/ACT scores for admissions. Although a college may not require test scores for admissions, many scholarships continue to require test scores.

Other OSAC Grants:

Chafee Grant: A federally-funded grant that helps Oregon's current and former foster youth pay for their higher education.

<u>Oregon National Guard State Tuition Assistance:</u> For current Oregon Army/Air guard members.

<u>Oregon Student Child Care Grant:</u> Child care funds for parents enrolled in college.

<u>Oregon Teacher Scholars Program Grant</u>: For candidates who have experience with diverse populations who are pursuing their preliminary licensure program for teaching, school counseling, social work, and school psychology.

<u>Oregon Tribal Student Grant:</u> For students attending an Oregon college/university and who are members of one of Oregon's nine federally recognized tribes.
